Candidates for Vice President:

Tomislav Longinovic (Ph.D. lowa State University) is Professor of Slavic and Comparative Literature at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. His books include *Borderline Culture* (1993), *Vampires Like Us* (2005), the co-edited and co-translated volume, with Daniel Weissbort: *Red Knight: Serbian Women Songs* (1992), and the edited volume: David Albahari, *Words are Something Else* (1996). He is also the author of several works of fiction, both in Serbian (*Sama Amerika*, 1995) and English (*Moment* of *Silence*, 1990). His most recent book, *Vampire Nation: Violence as Cultural Imaginary*, was published by Duke University Press in 2011. His research interests include South Slavic literatures and cultures; the Serbian language; literary theory; Central and East European literary history; comparative Slavic studies, translation studies, and cultural studies.

Igor Marjanovic (Ph.D. University College London) teaches architectural design and theory at Washington University in St. Louis. In 2009, he earned a National Education Honor Award from the American Institute of Architects (AIA) for his studio class offered as part of the Sam Fox School's Florence Summer Program. Together with Katerina Ruedi Ray, Marjanovic is also a principal of Ready Made Studio, an interdisciplinary design practice that was one of 10 selected exhibitors in the *Ten Visions: Chicago Architecture* exhibition at the Art Institute of Chicago in 2005. He has co-authored or so-edited four books: *Marina City: Bertrand Goldberg's Urban Vision* (Princeton Architectural Press), *The Portfolio* (Oxford Architectural Press), *Practical Experience* (Oxford Architectural Press, and On the Very Edge Modernism and Modernity in the Arts and Architecture of Interwar Serbia (1918–1941) (Leuven University Press). He has taught at the University of Illinois at Chicago, and Iowa State University, He graduated *summa cum laude* from the University of Belgrade, Serbia, and completed his diploma thesis at the Moscow Architectural Institute.
